Highly-demanded skills across sectors and countries

Now, let's get down to business and take a look into the current job vacancies and skills in demand across various sectors and countries in the European Union.

ICT has secured its position as the 5th most sought-after sector for hiring, following the likes of Administrative and Support Service Activities at the forefront, succeeded by Manufacturing, Consultancy, and Wholesale & Retail.

In this scenario, the European Skills Classification (ESCO), emerges as a pivotal tool, enabling а cross-border analysis of qualifications and competencies across Member States.

Rated on a scale from 0 to 8, with 0 denoting less complexity and responsibility, and 8 signifying the opposite, our exploration reveals compelling insights into the skills shaping the ICT job landscape.


At Level 1 of ESCO skills, a staggering 75.9% of ICT job offers prioritise self-management skills as the most crucial.

Following closely, at 72%, is the proficiency to adeptly manage IT systems and navigate laptop functionalities (65.2%), with communication, collaboration, and creativity skills closely trailing at 64%.

As we ascend to Level 3, marked by a higher specificity, a notable trend emerges. The most frequently sought skill is the 'demonstration of a willingness to learn' at 63.3%, followed by 'accessing and analysing digital data' at 53.8%. The third most in-demand skill for ICT job offers is 'collaborating in teams and networks' at 49.9%. It's noteworthy that, according to CEDEFOP's sectoral analysis, multilingual proficiency holds more significance in other sectors compared to the ICT domain.

In alignment with CEDEFOP's data, a significant 26.2% of Online Job Advertisements across the EU-27 focus on Information and Technology, specifically targeting Software and Application Developers and Analysts. Following closely, 'Manufacturing Laborers' secures the second spot at 7.8%, emphasising more manual and production-oriented tasks.

Subsequently, demand surfaces for 'Sales, Marketing, and Public Relations' professionals at 7%, while 'Engineering Professionals' and 'Database and Network Professionals' trail with 5.1% and 4.1%, respectively.

Surprisingly, it becomes evident that a significant portion of online job offers lack specific details regarding working hours, accounting for approximately half of the listings.

Within the subset of postings that do disclose this information, 41.1% present opportunities for full-time positions, underscoring a commitment to comprehensive engagement, while a more modest 11.9% cater to part-time roles.


Similarly, with regard to contractual terms, pertinent details are absent in 60% of the cases.

However, within the subset of online job offers that do provide contractual information, 16% are geared towards limited-duration contracts, indicative of a focus on short-term project requirements.

In contrast, 14.5% offer positions with unlimited durations, emphasising stability and long-term commitment. Furthermore, 4.7% of the opportunities are dedicated to internships and traineeships, providing a valuable avenue for emerging professionals to gain hands-on experience within the dynamic ICT sector.

OJAs by contract type (1)


OJAs by working hours (1)
